a. An Executive Session was held this evening at 5:30 p.m. before this meeting for the purpose of discussing personnel, litigation and negotiations.

VI. ADOPTION OF AGENDA

ACTION BY THE BOARD:

Motion was made by Debbie Kulick to adopt this agenda for November 20, 2023, as submitted, with the Board of Education reserving the right to add to the agenda and take further action on any items raised in executive session where immediate action on such items is considered to be in the best interest of the District. VII. APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Motion was made by Debbie Kulick to approve the minutes of the October 23, 2023, Board meeting. Motion was seconded by Steven Lurry and carried unanimously, 9-0.

VIII. REPORTS

a. Monroe Career & Technical Institute Update

Mrs. Lisa VanWhy said this is my last MCTI update. Someone else will need to make the report next month. The JOC met on November 6th at 7:00 p.m. An update on the storage building, which is a student project, the township required additional plans for insulation and electric so that is currently being worked on. The main office counter and desk at MCTI were updated by the students. It looks great. If anyone is ever up there in the main office, take a look. The students performed the work. In addition, we had the bid opening a week before our last meeting for the new proposed addition, which included the HVAC, general contractor, plumbing and electric. The project bid came in over 25% higher than the original estimate. Most people were surprised about that, but I was not. On the agenda tonight you will see the motion for the Monroe Career and Technical Institute to retain the 2023-2024 vocational subsidy in the total amount of \$1,410, 873.00, with East Stroudsburg Area School District's appropriation of \$398,303.00. The other districts have their contributions as well. We approved an Articulation Agreement with Delaware Valley College for the Criminal Justice Department and an Articulation Agreement with Northampton Community College for the Graphic Arts and Criminal Justice Departments. We also approved several Business and Financial items as well as Personnel items. The next meeting's date can be found on the MCTI website. Mr. Schlameuss said thank you for your service.

b. Colonial IU 20 Update

Dr. Damary Bonilla said the CIU 20 Board of Directors met on Wednesday, October 25, 2023. The Board approved several items:

- An agreement for a School Attendance Improvement Consultant for the East Stroudsburg Area School District
- Solicitation of bids for paper, janitorial supplies and fuel oil
- A grant for the development of future special educators
- An MOU with the CIU 20 Education Association, PSEA, to modify terms for Mental Health Workers
- A Collective Bargaining Agreement with Transport Workers Union of America

Communications that were shared with us that night included:

Mr. Jeff McDonald, Director of Behavioral Health Services, expressed gratitude to former employee, Darlene Klingel, who owns Klingel's Farm and Mazezilla. The business is closed to the public on Mondays during the fall season to provide opportunities for the CIU 20 classrooms to visit the farm and partake of autumn activities.

Dr. Wolfel shared a communication from Ms. Katrina Aiello, Elementary Special Education Supervisor from the ESASD. Ms. Aiello thanked the IU 20 for providing a training to the Transportation Department relating to the management of challenging behavior on the school bus. The training has been provided to other school districts in the region. Training is available upon request.

Dr. Wolfel shared a communication from Donna Hopper, Principal of Notre Dame Elementary School, who thanked the IU 20 for supporting their school in response to a tragedy among their community. The CIU 20 Flight Team (Crisis Response) responded by supporting the students and faculty. Dr. Wolfel thanked the several staff that were involved as well as reminded the districts that the Flight Team is available to all districts in the region in the aftermath of tragic events.

Dr. Wolfel recognized several teachers that completed their Induction Program. He also thanked several School Directors whose tenure had come to an end, Dr. Damary Bonilla from ESASD served from 2019-2023 and was Vice President, Merlyn Clarke, Stroudsburg Area School District served 9 years from 2013-2017, and 2018-2023 and Kenneth Butz, Nazareth Area School District, served 20 years from 2003-2023. He was Vice President from 2007 -2008. Each director received a Colonial IU 20 Resolution for their years of service as well as a recognition from the Pennsylvania House and Senate.

The IU 20 Newsletter, "The Twenty" is available to everyone and a link can be provided to all who request it. There is no CIU 20 meeting in November. The next meeting is scheduled for December 13th 2023 at 7:30 p.m. at the CIU 20 main office in Easton.

Mr. Schlameuss said thank you for your service on the IU 20 Board and for being their Vice President.

c. Property & Facilities Committee Update

Mrs. Lisa VanWhy said the Property & Facilities Committee met on October 4th at 5:30 p.m. On the agenda, you will find a F350 4x4 Supercab - Koch 33 Auto for \$53,025.00. This is to replace a bucket truck that is back there collecting rust that we cannot use. This truck will also be used by the employees as an extra work truck as needed. I hope that the new Property & Facilities Committee will continue with the project to renovate the South Stadium. It is in dire need, so I hope that continues. Mr. Schlameuss said thank you for your service on the committee and for running it for many years. We appreciate all of your efforts with that. Mrs. VanWhy said thank you. We have done a lot of work. Mr. Schlameuss agreed. Mr. Lurry said great job, Lisa.

d. Education Programs & Resources Committee Update - - esasd.net/epr

Dr. Damary Bonilla said the Education Programs & Resources Committee met on November 8th via Zoom at 7:00 p.m. We had several items for discussion. Thank you, to our Board President for coming to comment about the good work that has been done on this committee. For those who do not know, the committee was started in December of 2019 when several of us joined the Board. We have done a lot of great work together. There were several updates including our monthly update from the BeAlliance which always reminds us of dates to observe, important holidays and important information about diversity within our community. It turned out that our meeting took place on STEAM Day. We had an update on some of those programs. We had a wonderful presentation by the IU 20 team, Mickey and Katarina about the support that they are able to provide for families of our special needs students as well as how to further engage and empower families. Thank you to Mr. Baddick for following up with them. There will be several conversations on how to bring more support to our ESASD special students' families. We also had presentations from several academic clubs that are available to students in our district, including DECA, Girls Who Code, Robotics, and for the many amazing opportunities. They help our student to grow and bring external visibilities to our district. It was great to hear from our students. We also had a Communications Department Update. We had several advisory recommendations for consideration by the Finance Committee and the Board of Education, which are on the agenda tonight. Thank you Dr. Vitulli for your partnership on the Committee as well as for the lovely recognition. Thank you for my colleagues for the collaboration on the committee over the years and your kind words. Mr. Schlameuss said, thank you for your efforts on this committee. You made the committee work and provided a leadership to sustain it to go forward.

g. Student School Board Representatives –

Miss Yashvi Kopanati, High School North, reported as follows:

Good Evening School Board Members, Faculty, and Guests.

Before I start my report, I would like to formally introduce myself to everyone in attendance today. My name is Yashvi Kopanati and I am a senior at High School North who will be representing North's student body this year. In our school, I am the president of three service organizations as well as the acting captain for six clubs and sports along with my participation in other activities. I have held the 1st rank in my class all throughout high school and am striving to receive the title of Valedictorian later this year. I hope to attend the University of Pennsylvania to pursue a degree in Computer Science and further my education through law school. With that being said, let's delve into the amazing achievements and positive events that occurred this month.

To start off my report, I would like to highlight some students who were recognized through MCTI's Outstanding Students Program for the 1st quarter: Y. Urena-Aquino for 9th grade English, E. Not only was the music enthralling, but the director of the program who showcased their jazz and rock ensembles gave our choir students some information on their school, inspiring some to even consider applying. It became a core memory for a lot of students, including me. The North Chorale, the Elite Choir Group at North, has been rehearsing their Christmas ensemble for this season and is getting ready to perform throughout the holidays at Tree Lightings, hospitals, and even a Veteran's Dav breakfast hosted by Senator Brown on the 30th. To go along with the Christmas spirit, our Cure Cafe will be decorated with artwork done by our own North students. This past month, the school was informed that seven students from our music program are going to be representing us at the American Choir Directors Association Regional Festival. K. Ulanday, I. To cap off the music section of the report, our school has just announced that the musical for this year will be "Alice By Heart" and auditions will be held in December.

Our Speech and Debate Team is on its way to qualifying for the EPC Competition later this winter and is working hard to keep improving and honing our skills as we face off our last school next week. IX. PUBLIC PARTICIPATION

Limited to comments on this agenda by residents and taxpayers of the school district (3 min. ea.)

- A. Ms. Jane Gagliaro said I would like to thank all of the School Board members for all that you have done for our community. I would like to thank Dr. Bonilla, Mrs. VanWhy and Mr. Lurry for your service. I am so grateful for everything you have done for the community. I wanted to bring to your attention something that I learned at the Stroudsburg School Board. You have Student Representatives here from North and South. I was wondering if the Board would consider MCTI students to participate in a monthly report as well to give a different perspective from those students' point of view. I think it is important since they are a big part of the community. I think one from South and one from North would give us a better perspective.
- B. Mr. Ruben Torres said Mr. Chairman, I rise to urge to vote no in naming the stadium after Mr. Christian. There is not doubt that he was passionate about the sport that he coached. He was also adamant about not letting the girls' field hockey team or girls' soccer team use the stadium for practice or games. He even protested against the young ladies' use of the facilities. One in good conscious cannot name a stadium after one who wanted to exclude and deny our young women fair and equitable access to the stadium. Please vote no.
- C. Ms. Laura Massaro said on the agenda tonight you have a significant raise for all of your Administrators, and I think that is pretty absurd right next to the Superintendent's raise you voted for a few months ago. I still have not seen anyone show up. No one is around. There is still no leadership or accountability anywhere. Nothing has changed in two months. We are still bringing all these issues to you, and I don't see anybody anywhere taking accountability for anything. There is no bathroom opened in one area of the high school. I don't understand why we cannot have teachers monitor these bathrooms in between classes. Why would you send a kid a quarter of a mile down the hallway to go to the bathroom to miss 20 minutes of class? That is not productive. Why are you not doing better? I really do not understand why you are not holding anyone accountable. Even in the cafeteria, there are people online complaining about the food in the cafeteria. Your answer to that is that your suppliers are sending you whatever they want to. You should get a better supplier. You are literally poisoning my child every time she buys school food. Because no one knows what is in it anymore, and she, as a first grader, will ask what is in this food. She then comes home with a rash if it contains sesame that she is allergic to. Since people don't know, she eats the food. Supposedly there is a flag that comes up when she checks out. I am not letting her buy food anymore. I send lunch with her. Also, I noticed on my way to work this morning, the lights that flash 15 mph for when school is in session are still going off on days that children are not in session. You are liable if someone gets into an accident on 209 or any other road. You may want to have someone turn them off. Please do better.

- A. Mrs. VanWhy said I was asked to list my accomplishments, but I am not doing that. It has been a pleasure to serve the community and this district for the past eight years. I was elected to serve the community with no particular agenda, if nothing else, but to be fiscally responsible. Incidentally, I never check Facebook, but I saw a Facebook post that somebody said that I voted to raise taxes. I challenge that person to show me when I voted to raise taxes. You can have that discussion with me. I would like to thank all of the grassroots constituents who supported me in this last election. As a State Senator said when I was wallowing, you know the good work that you have done. Unfortunately, in this last election, I was not financially or actively supported by the union. They worked extra hard to get their people in. Nice job. I wish everyone the best moving forward. In the words of Tom Petty, "even the losers get lucky sometimes". I may see you all in another platform soon. I wish everyone a great holiday. Thank you.
- B. Mr. Steven Lurry said I would like to say it was a pleasure to serve the district and community. My hope is that the new Board members coming in that their focal point is on the students and the community. Also, that diversity would continue to grow and expand and not be something that will be faded out. I thank my colleagues, Administration, teachers, the community and the voters who allowed me to serve.
- C. Dr. Damary Bonilla said I am last but never least. I want to start off by expressing my gratitude to those who elected me four years ago to serve the community in this capacity. I also thank those who have supported me throughout my term. It has been an honor. I live with a sense of purpose and urgency to create a better community and society for all. As a School Board Director, I have showed up as an authentic advocate for every East Stroudsburg Area School District student to have access to a quality and equitable education experience, particularly during an unprecedented global pandemic. Amidst the challenges, our district was able to ensure student success and shine as leaders in the region across the Commonwealth because we were focused, creative and flexible. I credit our district wins to our courageous leadership by our Superintendent, who is at a conference this evening, and his dynamic team unwavering dedication to our educators who are on the front lines and a steady commitment from our staff keeping things moving and the adaptability by the School Board. Thank you to my colleagues for the camaraderie and the fighting to make good decisions for students. I am even thankful for the haters because every experience has allowed me to learn, grow and become stronger. Thank you to the Administration for a great thought partnership. Dr. Vitulli, we have done a great work in the Education Programs and Resources Committee (EPR). Thank you for the collaboration to improve how we serve students, especially through EPR. I have cheered since its inception in 2019. We've created a platform

for district leaders and educators to share the great work that they are doing, to highlight external resources and facilitate an ongoing communication channel with the community. I have also served on several negotiations committees, on which I did my best to support the needs of those bargaining units, but never rubber stamping. Public service is not easy because you can't please everyone. People don't always agree, and we are living in extreme political times, where many put politics over people. I do not politicize education. I came here to shift the dynamics of this governing body and to disrupt the status quo. I'm optimistic that my leadership will leave a lasting impact in this district. If you take anything away from my journey as a School Board Director, please buy into the notion that every person can make a positive difference by showing up genuinely and passionately. I want to paint a visual of what I am referring to. On this School Board, I was the first Hispanic elected in 2019. I am the only one of 9 with a doctorate and I am the second youngest. On the CIU 20 Board, where I represented the East Stroudsburg Area School District since December 2019 and served as Vice President since 2020, I was the first Hispanic and the first person of color to join that Board. I am one of four women, one of four with a doctorate and the second youngest. In Pike County, I am the only Hispanic elected official and in Monroe County, I am one of four Hispanic elected officials. At the State level, I am one of 135 Hispanic School Board Directors, which is 3% lowest of all racial and ethnic groups across the Commonwealth. When I am not at these tables, a diverse voice will be missing. Last December, I had the honor of being interviewed for the position of State Secretary of Education among a small group and while I didn't secure the job, I was able to share my vision for improving education for every Pennsylvania student. I hope my example motivates each of you to envision yourself as a change agent for our community, especially our students and particularly the 67% students of color, not including mixed race students in our district who see themselves represented by me. While my accomplishments were not enough to secure the approval by the powers that be to endorse me for a second term, I am not detered by politics by losing the seat or the title, because at the end of the day no one can take away my work ethic, my integrity, my strong leadership and my highest credentials. My focus in this role has been bringing visibility to our district by bringing supplemental funding, visiting students and encouraging them to strive to be their greatest and be a voice to their families. My focus was also bringing a bridge to diverse students so that we can include more inclusive policies and equitable spaces throughout the East Stroudsburg Area School District. Joining this School Board did not make me, and it certainly won't break me. As a mother of middle school students in the district, my work here will continue just from a different angle. Rest assured that our paths will continue to cross. Everyone stay safe and enjoy the holiday season before us. Thank you.

Mr. Schlameuss said thank you all for your attendance and participation. This is not an easy job and you do not get paid for doing it. We spend a lot of time and do a lot of work. There is a lot that goes into this, and you have done a great job in keeping the district moving forward. There are a lot of things that the community does not see, i.e., how we help Administration to move in a good direction. There will be things that the community will find fault because there is a lot that goes on. No one is perfect. We have a lot of great things happening. The reality is that we have great stuff happening and it is our job to ensure that the momentum moves forward. Our job is to make sure that we are doing everything for the children. You three have epitomized that process. Thank you.
