918. TITLE I PARENTAND FAMILY ENGAGEMENT

The Board recognizes that parent and family engagement contributes to the achievement of academic standards by students participating in Title I programs. The Board views the education of students as a cooperative effort among the school, parents/guardians and community.

2. Definition

Parent and **Family** (**Family Member**) - these terms are used interchangeably and shall include caregivers, a legal guardian or other person standing in loco parentis such as a grandparent or stepparent with whom the child lives, a person who is legally responsible for the child's welfare, or a legally appointed Education Decision Maker of a child participating in a Title I program.

In compliance with federal law, the district and parents/guardians of students participating in Title I programs shall jointly develop and agree upon a written parent and family engagement policy. (See 918 Attachment)

When developing and implementing this policy, the district shall ensure the policy describes how the district will:

The Board directs the district and each of its schools with a Title I program to:

- 3. Include parents and family members in the development of the Title I Parent and Family Engagement Policy. Following adoption of the policy by the Board, the policy shall be:

	4. Provide opportunities and conduct meaningful collaborations with parents and family members in the planning and implementation of Title I programs, activities and procedures.
	5. Provide the coordination, technical assistance and other support necessary to assist participating schools in planning and implementing effective parent and family engagement activities to improve student academic achievement and school performance.
	6. Develop activities that promote the schools' and parents'/guardians' capacity for strong parent and family engagement.
	7. Coordinate and integrate parent and family engagement strategies with appropriate programs, as provided by law.
	8. Involve parents/guardians in an annual evaluation of the content and effectiveness of the policy in improving the academic quality of schools served under Title I.
	9. Identify barriers to participation by parents/guardians who are economically disadvantaged, are disabled, have limited English proficiency, have limited literacy, or are of any racial or ethnic minority.
	10. Use findings of annual evaluations to design strategies for more effective parent and family engagement.

53. Delegation of Responsibility	The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that the district's Title I parent and family engagement policy, plan and programs comply with the requirements of federal law.

	1. Providing communications in clear and simple language.
	2. Posting information for parents and family members on the district's website.
	3. Including a telephone number for parents and family members to call with questions.
	4. Partnering with community agencies, which may include libraries, recreation centers, community-based organizations and faith-based organizations to assist in sharing information.
Pol. 138	5. Provide language access services to families with limited English proficiency through on-site or telephonic translation and interpretation services, as appropriate.
6. 4.Guidelines	An annual meeting of parents/guardians of participating Title I students shall be held to explain the goals and purposes of the Title I program. Each district school

Sec. 6318	operating a Title I program shall hold an annual meeting of parents and family members at a convenient time, to explain the goals and purposes of Title I programs and to inform them of their right to be involved. Parents/Guardians and family members shall be given the opportunity to participate in the design, development, operation and evaluation of the program. Parents/Guardians and family members shall be encouraged to participate in planning activities, to offer suggestions, and to ask questions regarding policies and programs.

Sec. 6318	In addition to the required annual meeting, additional parent/guardian meetings The schools with Title I programs shall offer a flexible number of meetings which shall be held at various times of the day morning and evening. Title I funds may be used to enable parent and family member attendance at meetings through payment of transportation, child care costs or home visits.
20 U.S.C. Sec. 6318 20 U.S.C. Sec. 6312	The schools shall involve parents and family members in an organized, ongoing and timely way, in the planning, review and improvement of Title I programs, the Title I Parent and Family Engagement Policy and the joint development of the Title I Plan.
	At these meetings, parents/Guardians and family members shall be provided:

	2. Description and explanation of the curriculum in use, the forms of academic

assessment used to measure student progress, and the proficiency achievement levels students are expected to meet of the academic standards.

- 3. Opportunities to formulate suggestions and to participate, as appropriate, in decisions relating to the education of their children.
- 4. Opportunities to submit parent/guardian comments about the program to the district level.

If sufficient, Title I funding may be used to facilitate parent/guardian attendance at meetings through payment of transportation and child care costs.

Opportunities shall be provided for parents/guardians to meet with the classroom and Title I specialist to discuss their child's progress.

Parents/Guardians may be given guidance as to how they can assist and monitor their child's progress at home in the education of their child.

To ensure the continuous engagement of parents and family members in the joint development of the Title I Plan and with the school support and improvement process, the district shall:

- 1. Establish meaningful, ongoing two-way communication between the district, staff and parents and family members.
- 2. Communicate with parents and family members about the plan and seek their input and participation through the use of newsletters, the district website, email, telephone, and parent and teacher conferences.
- 3. Train personnel on how to collaborate effectively with parents and family members with diverse backgrounds that may impede their participation, such as limited literacy or language difficulty.
- 4. Analyze and share the results of the Title I Parent/Family Survey.
- 5. Post school performance data on the district's website.
- 6. Distribute and discuss the School-Parent and Family Compact.
- 7. Host various parent and family nights at each school building with a Title I program.
- 8. Actively recruit parents and family members to participate in school review and improvement planning.
- 9. Invite participation of parents and family members at the regular comprehensive planning committee meetings and school improvement plan meetings to obtain input and propose school improvement initiatives.

	Title I Funds
20 U.S.C. Sec. 6318	Unless exempt by law, the district shall reserve at least one percent (1%) of its Title I funds to assist schools in conducting parent and family engagement activities. Parents and family members shall be involved in the decisions regarding how the Title I reserved funds are used for parent and family engagement activities.
20 U.S.C. Sec. 6318	Not less than ninety percent (90%) of the reserved funds shall be distributed to district schools with a Title I program, with priority given to high need schools. The district shall use the Title I reserved funds to conduct activities and strategies consistent with this policy, including:
	1. Supporting programs that reach parents and family members at home, in the community, and at school.
	2. Disseminating information on best practices focused on parent and family engagement, especially best practices for increasing the engagement of economically disadvantaged parents and family members.
	3. Engaging in any other activities and strategies that the district determines are appropriate and consistent with this policy.
